Global grant Ambassadorial scholars are individuals who are pursuing a career in one of the six areas of focus. Their graduate-level educational goals should support this career interest.



Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution



Disease Prevention and Treatment



Water and Sanitation



Maternal and Child Health



Basic Education and Literacy



Economic and Community Development

Specific eligibility requirements and conditions for global grants include:

- The candidate must be proficient in the native language of the host country (please contact your global grant coordinator for exceptions).
- The candidate's program of study must be at the graduate level.
- The scholar must be traveling abroad for study.
- The scholarship is for a term of one academic year.
- Scholars need to live in their host district.
- Global grants follow a two-step application process: a proposal followed within six months by an application. The candidate must be admitted to his/her study program by the time of the application, but not at the time of the proposal.
- At the time of the proposal, the candidate must know where he/she wants to study and the sponsors must identify the name of a primary contact in the host district.
- Scholarships may not be used for studies that are already underway.

In global grants, ambassadorial skills are optional for scholars. The primary consideration is forging a link between Rotary and future skilled professionals within an area of focus. That said, global grant scholars are expected to participate in Rotary activities, and their Rotarian sponsors should provide opportunities for them to do so.

The candidate should be someone who:

- Possesses excellent leadership skills and potential
- Has a proven record of success in his/her academic field or vocation
- Has demonstrated a personal commitment to community service
- Has well-defined and realistic goals
- Has concrete ideas as to how he/she will make advances within his/her chosen career field

Membership Matters

June Attendance and Membership Reports are still coming in and as usual we had a few Clubs who needed to drop a few members at the end of the fiscal year.....am sure these were Rotarians who had not been participating or who were not current on their dues. I am confident that these Clubs had tried repeatedly to work with these members regarding their attendance and arrearages before making the "drop" decision. While the Membership numbers are not complete, it appears the District will fall a bit short in our goal of breaking even or possibly celebrating a modest increase in our numbers.

It goes without saying, membership has to be an ongoing activity in every Club and I use our own Rock Island Club as a prime example. The Rock Island Club recruited something like 12 new members during the past fiscal year but with resignations and "drops" we will probably end up with a mere net increase of only 3 members. What happened?? A couple of drops were a combination of non-attendance and non-payment of dues. The others were changes in jobs or moves from the area or a combination of the two. When we are targeting the young professionals, we must expect these up and coming executive types will be subject to promotions and possible transfers from our communities. However, a Rotary Club in their new locales might profit from these individuals coming to their communities. Likewise our Clubs might benefit by involving a young executive moving into our Communities who had been associated with Rotary in their former areas.

Membership efforts for 2011-12 have to start immediately and I am encouraged by contacts received from Clubs who are already asking for some assistance with the plans for this year. Requests for speakers on Membership, for interacting with Club's Membership Committees and for training are already being received. We will meet as many of these requests as humanly possible. Please make every effort to have your Membership Chair present or represented at the Deere Valley Seminar on Thursday evening, August 4. In addition to having a Keynote Speaker on Membership, we will have a panel of Rotarians who will share practical hands-on strategies used to increase their membership.

Thanks for your efforts in 2010-11. The District Membership Development Team and I look forward to working with each and every Club for success in this new year.

We are THIS CLOSE in the fight with Polio

The 2010/2011 was a banner year for the foundation in the district. donations to Polio were outstanding as Rotary continues to fulfill the promise to the children of the world that they some day would live without the fear of paralysis.

In the four endemic countries the number of cases continue to decline to levels that would have been impossible to believe a few short years ago.

New cases are appearing in several countries which have been Polio free in the past. To respond to these cases, Rotary with partners, conduct sub national immunization days to reach the children at risk in those areas.

We are "THIS CLOSE" to the final eradication of Polio. Now is the time to continue to redouble the funding of the eradication plan. No better time than the start of a new Rotary year. Governor Leo has established a goal of \$35,000 for the district. As we have over 2,000 Rotarians this is about \$17.00 per Rotarian. In an effort to bring Polio closer to your club try to find someone in the area who has a story to tell. It can be some one who is a Polio survivor or some one who was involved during Polio epidemics in the 40's and 50's. At that time ambulance services were operated by Funeral Directors. One Funeral Director provided transportation to Peoria for children who needed to go the specialty center. This he did without charge.

Seeing pictures of children paralyzed by Polio now should be enough of a stimulus for Rotarians to donate realizing that these children could be our children or grandchildren.

"TIME TO PREPARE YOUR DISTRICT COMMUNITY GRANT"

Each Club should be in the process of preparing their Grant Application by assessing their community needs and develop a project plan which includes a spending plan. Organize a meeting with local service providers, local officials and/or recipients. Remember, district grants are small grants given to clubs to be used for Humanitarian, Public Safety, and Educational community needs or small international club assistance projects. NOTE: Grants will be in amounts between \$500.00 and \$1,500.00. Small international projects will only be considered if funding allows. The District Web Page at www.rotary6420.org has the application forms and the Timeline and Guidelines that must be met by the August 15, 2011 DEADLINE.

Sorry, Non-Giving clubs to the Rotary Foundation last year need not apply because you are not eligible.

Reach Within to Embrace Humanity

Each year, Rotary Themes are created to benchmark the Rotary International presidency and also to serve as an internal message to clubs. For the 2011-2012 year President Banerjee has chosen "Reach Within and Embrace Humanity."

As large as the Rotary organization is, on a personal level Rotary means different things to individuals. Taking the personal meaning and using it for the larger good is the basis of President Banerjee's message. Each Rotarian must act on the greater good from the inside out – as in Ghandi's quote "You must be the change you wish to see in the world." To promote peace, there must be peace within, and you can't take care of the world without taking care of your immediate surroundings first.

In President Banerjee's own words "In 2011-12, I will ask Rotarians to Reach Within to Embrace Humanity . I will ask you to search first within yourselves, to understand that all of us, everywhere, have the same dreams, the same hopes, the same aspirations, and similar dilemmas. When we understand, and truly feel, that others' needs are the same as our own, we begin to understand how important our work is...Together, we will Reach Within to Embrace Humanity. And in peace, harmony, and friendship, we will bring change – and a more joyful world."

The theme graphics are available on the Rotary.org web site and should be used for the club's purposes, whether it is on dues invoices, on the web site and in the weekly newsletter. The theme could also be reinforced at the conclusion of each weekly meeting, as the club president brings the meeting to a close, remind members to "Reach Within and Embrace Humanity" as the final thought of the meeting. President Banerjee has given the organization the tools, and the clubs and members can use the tools to make the difference in communities, families, and individual human lives.

LOVES PARK- Elizabeth "Betty" J. Smith, 67, of Loves Park entered into eternal life Thursday, June 30, 2011. Born Feb 1, 1944, in Rockford the daughter of Francis and Lois (Halton) Ryan. Attended Muldoon School, Rockford West High School and graduated from St. Anthony School of Nursing in 1965. Married David M. Smith on Aug. 14, 1971, in Marshall, Mich.

Betty was a Registered Nurse (RN) for more than 40 years and it defined her person. After nursing school she worked at St. Anthony Hospital for several years. She then left and worked as a clinical nurse for Canfield Clinic (Brookside) both downtown and at the east Rockford site. After having her children she resumed work at Riverside Clinic (now Physician Immediate Care) as a nurse until her retirement in 2005. Humble and strong she was generous to others, thinking of the needs of others before her own.

Betty was a member of the Loves Park Rotary Club and a recipient of the "service above self" awards at both the club and district level. She served as District 6420-Outbound Coordinator in the Youth Exchange program for several years and was a Paul Harris Fellow times three. Good Programs to Share

Is it your turn as Program Chair for your club and you don't have a clue who to get?

This section might help you!!!!

Kamwenge Glory Primary School

When Debbie Damron heard that the school in Kamwenge Uganda had been destroyed she set her mind at helping to raise the money to build a new school for the children of the community. The projected total needed to complete the school was \$10,000 and they were about \$7,000 short. Debbie started by baking and selling homemade cookies to her students. Other small donations started coming in and they have increased over time.



The project was organized much like a Labor of Love home here in the United States. The organizers knew that unless they made the school something that the community could make their own, it would never survive. Decisions about the school were made at town meetings and each week a day was set aside when all the community would work on the building of the school. The building was actually constructed in 4 phases: 1) the foundation, 2) walls, 3) Roof, windows, and doors, and 4) Painting. A floor was never planned into the budget, so when it was added another \$200.00 needed to be added to the original cost.

The day of the grand opening, March 22, 2011 everyone in the community was there. The visitors, including Debbie Damron, were greeted with drums and singing, and the children gave them gifts which included their own dolls. Of course, the guests also came with gifts for the children like soccer balls, volleyballs, dolls, toothbrushes, and school supplies. Ottawa's Central School students sent math sets for each of the 200 students.

The community also put on the "ultimate outdoor picnic" for the guests, who could only enjoy the smells due to local parasites that don't sicken the locals, but would prove most unpleasant for any non-locals. The second day, all of the desks arrived. Originally told that each desk would sit two students they ordered enough desks for the entire 200 student population plus a few extra. However, each desk could sit four, so they ended up with way too many desks. The extras have been put in storage in the hopes that a second school might develop in the same area. The moneys brought in for the school surpassed the initial goal and some of the extra was used to roof the church, which is used as an extra classroom during the week. To completely restore the church another \$8500 is needed.

The school's next project is to get a Maize Milling Machine to help keep the school open. This will cost another \$10,000. They are also hoping to build a rain collection cistern, and a passable bridge over the swamp to keep the community safe during the flood season. Children have drown just walking from one place to the next on deteriorating walkways. This could be a workable Rotary Project with us working with Rotarians in District 9200.
