Elise is in Nigeria now doing good work under the Rotary Foundation and is unable to send an article for this month. This is last months just in case you were not able to read it last month.

After a very educational and high energy Zone Institute in Lombard this past week, you should be hearing about it from those 12 District Leaders who attended from 6420. We were a solid group that I believe represented you well through the long days and short nights.

Two days before the Institute began, our DGE Hammon, DGN Lee, District Trainer Thacker and District Foundation Chair PDG Cadigan trained for their respective district jobs. We were also represented by DG Patterson, PDGs Prather, Luckenbill, Burch, and PDG/Treasurer Papich. AG coordinator Burke and AG/Fund Development Chair Giesen also attended the Institute. Former Ambassadorial Scholar and current Global Grant recipient Hannah Warren drove to Institute to spend Saturday with the many Rotarians who support her work in India and wish to follow her service work with Rotary.

RI President-elect Sakuji Tanaka(2012-13/Japan) gave one of his first speeches without a translator. John Hewko, the new General Secretary/CEO of RI &The Rotary Foundation was both a plenary speaker and answered Rotarians questions during an hour-long Q&A, along with Peter Deberge, RI Deputy General Secretary and CFO. Trustee Sam Okudzeto, of Ghana, attended the entire Institute, speaking formally at a plenary and always making himself available for questions related to TRF. One goal of every Zone Institute is to have senior RI staff, Directors and Trustees available for Rotarians to express concerns to and ask questions of. This one did not disappoint.

Zone is a marathon of learning what's most current in Rotary International and The Rotary and Foundation from those who lead the organization. Rotarians return to Institute each year to learn their job if they are a DGE, DGN, District Foundation Chair or District Trainer. Many other Rotary leaders return each year at their own expense for the learning, inspiration and fellowship with Rotarians that you build friendships with through working together in projects and programs of Rotary. Each of the four Future Vision Districts in Zones 28/29 were featured in reporting during a plenary about their success stories. The 19 clubs in our district, currently in various stages of working on Global Grants, provided the stories of inspiration to other districts that are looking for ways to involve their clubs in the new Future Vision process of grant making. As Rotarians decide to serve the clubs through district leadership, attending a Zone Institute is an excellent way to better understand why the world needs Rotary and how easy it is to assist clubs get bigger, better and bolder when there are so many great Rotary members.

An update from Megan Luczak



Bienvenidos a Salamanca!

After a long year of planning, many complications, and a lot of persistence, I have finally arrived in Salamanca, Spain and begun my year abroad as the 2011-2012 District 6420 Global Grant Ambassadorial Scholar! I am very excited to be in Spain's "Ciudad Dorada" (golden city) and to have the opportunity to represent my hometown and the rest of Rotary District 6420.

Salamanca is located in Western Spain, in the province of Castilla y Leon. About three hours west of Madrid by bus, the city is home to about 160,000 inhabitants and a population of nearly 40,000 students from all over Spain and all over the world. My own classmates represent this rich diversity – they are all ages and come from various universities of Spain and various countries. Luckily for me, in my master's program of 23 students, there are also 5 foreigners! Two of my classmates are originally from Brazil, one is from the UK, one is from Ecuador and one is from France.

During my year abroad here in Salamanca, I will be enrolled in the Universidad de Salamanca, where I am studying in a one-year Master's program in Public Policy and Social Services. I'm excited for not only the diversity of perspectives that my classmates can offer, but also for the breadth of study of public policies that I will be examining this year. I enrolled and started classes this week in the university, and will be taking classes in the following areas: public policy, project evaluation, sociocultural transformations in advanced societies, demographic changes and family structures, inequality in healthcare and healthcare systems, the job market and employment policies, international cooperation for development, immigration and migration policies, social exclusion, and most importantly, education systems and education policies.

My area of focus under the Rotary Foundation's Future Vision Plan is primary education and basic literacy. With this base of knowledge in a number of areas of public policy, I'll be developing a "trabajo fin de master," or final master's project, that explores problems in the Spanish education system at the primary level. Over the next few months, I'm excited to start formulating ideas for my project and then start delving into the research!

SUMMER 2012 YOUTH EXCHANGE OPPORTUNITY

In addition to all that is offered in our "flagship" Year-Long Exchange Program, we are able to offer to area students ages 15-19 an amazing opportunity to participate in our Summer Youth Exchange Program!

The Short Term Youth Exchange Program, sponsored by participating Rotary Clubs within our District, offers the chance for a student to be paired with another student in a country of their choice. The students then spend four weeks in each of their homes, sharing in one another's culture and family life, hosted by each student's local Rotary Club.

There is no language fluency requirement as the foreign students who participate, and often their family members, generally speak English as a second language. Participating families are responsible for travel costs, passport fees and spending money, and the reciprocal expense of hosting and providing local activities for the other student while that student visits here.

Participating Rotary often cover the \$200 District Application Fee which covers postage and supplies, Orientation fees (not including hotel room), name badges, exchange cards, and other items. The family's primary expenses will be the cost of the student's travel, passport fees, spending money, and the cost of hosting the visiting Exchange Student here for four weeks, possibly including local activities and travel.

Area students in past years have had fascinating experiences in Italy, Germany, Spain, Finland, Belgium, England, and Austria, and the list goes on. Countries in the northern hemisphere are preferred as the students' summer vacations are closely matched. Please note that this program is also open to the children and relatives of our own Rotary members!

To get your Club involved: Put an article in your local papers, post on line, and get the word out to your local high school(s). You might also host an informational meeting to connect with those students and parents who might be interested. The Club should also determine its budget for the number of students you are willing to sponsor @\$200 each (application fees), or whether you will ask applicants' parents to pay that cost also. The Gates Challenge

The Gates Challenge has been a great effort for the eradication of polio. The challenge was for Rotary to raise \$200 million dollars between July of '09 and June of '12. To date \$190 million has been raised. No doubt the remaining \$10 million will be raised in the next 8 months.

With this and the continued support of our partners (Unicef, World Health Organization, and the Center for Disease Control) eradication marches steadily forward. In India there has been only 1 case of Polio so far this year with that being early in 2011. Progress is also being made in Nigeria, Pakistan, and Afghanistan.

At the present time Africa is the area of most concern as Polio has emerged in several countries which had been free of Polio for some time. This points out that we must eradicate Polio and not just contain it. The cost of containment would be necessary forever whereas eradication would allow the end of Polio immunization as has occurred with Small Pox. Oct. 24th is World Polio Day. What a great time to launch a public awareness campaign about Polio in your community and perhaps continue to raise funds throughout the rest of Oct. and into Nov. which is foundation month.

For some time Rotary International has encouraged local clubs to involve the general public in contributing to Polio eradication. The Illinois Quad Cities Rotary clubs area have joined together to increase public awareness about Polio and encourage donations to assist Rotary. Ideas that we wish to use include are a lighting, newspaper articles, collections sites around the area, and a collection day at some of the local stores.

Remember we have gone beyond "The Final Inch" and are now "This Close" to Polio eradication.
